

Introduction



Purpose

This is a guidance document intended to aid understanding and use of the new Hertfordshire Equipment Services (HES) policy.

Content

This document consist of flow charts to navigate the new 'ladder approach' to prescription of equipment.

What is a 'ladder approach'?

A ladder approach to prescription consists of grouping and organising types of equipment based on functional need. Each functional need pathway is graded- based on the severity of need in efforts to help prevent overprescribing of loaned equipment.

Service user preference or familiarity for a piece of equipment is not part of the assessment process. If the user is used to a given item but it is not where they are on the functional need ladder, than they should not be prescribed it – The service User should not be prescribed an item that is more complex than their ability (or position) requires on the Functional Ladder.

Over-prescription is when service users are accidentally *prescribed more equipment and/or more complicated equipment than what they need*. This has serious consequences for both service users and the service. It can lead to service users losing independence faster as they grow used to equipment that is more than they need. It can clutter the home causing stress to service users and family members. It can increase costs to the service meaning money is unavailable to help service users elsewhere.

The ladder approach is meant to aid prescribers finding appropriate equipment that is compliant with HES's new policy.

Some other things to consider:

Functional need of service users is the first, last, and only thing being assessed in terms of prescribing equipment. Equipment is being loaned on this basis alone.


Brand names are not present in this document to encourage flexibility in ordering and to decrease brand loyalty. Relationship to equipment reps or familiarity with a particular item should **never** be used as criteria when assessing functional need.

Service user preference or familiarity for a piece of equipment is not part of the assessment process. If the user is used to a given item but it is not where they are on the functional need ladder, than they should not be prescribed it.

Equipment is being **loaned** to service users. This must be made clear to service users and their families, this equipment is owned by HES who make it available on loan. It is not gifted to the service user.





Increased complexity of pressure relief and posture support for client, can support range of aperture variations








Increased postural needs that require a tilted position to deliver personal care








Seating Functional Need Pathways









- Service user weight
